Program Overview



ACCESSIBILITY	We believe that every pet owner should have access to affordable veterinary care.
COLLABORATION	We work closely with reputable, accredited veterinary clinics within Durham Region. These clinics provide their expertise, their facility, and skilled veterinary professionals.
COMMUNITY IMPACT	By preventing unplanned litters, we contribute to a healthier and more sustainable pet population and reduces the number of unwanted, unowned pets by municipal animal services.



Subsidized Procedures

Funds received from a municipality will be used only to subsidize spay/neuter surgeries for the animals of residents in that municipality who are income qualified at application time.



Education and Outreach

We conduct educational outreach campaigns and awareness programs to promote responsible pet care.


